This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

KS3 – <u>all</u> our young people in Y7-9 access 1 hour of music per week.

KS4 – GCSE music (Eduqas) is taught as an optional subject, and our young people access 5 hours of music per fortnight. We currently have around 25% of each year group opting for GCSE music. This is significantly higher than the national average.

Music for children with SEND

All young people are given the opportunity to participate in music lessons, regardless of their additional needs. Lessons are adapted and differentiated, where necessary, to cater for SEND and groupings are carefully considered for team work. Teachers know their young people and any additional needs. Questioning is carefully constructed to give all learners the chance to feel able, confident, safe, and happy in the music classroom. Behaviour for learning is paramount to building positive relationships with all young people, and this in turn provides a positive climate for learning. This ethos supports SEND and allows all young people to make progress. Music facilities are on the ground floor and anyone requiring disabled access is well catered for.

Our Curriculum

Our curriculum is informed, in part, by the Model Music Curriculum, Musical Contexts and Eduqas GCSE Music. From the first lesson in Y7, our young people learn to sing, perform, compose, listen, appraise, and analyse music from a wide range of genres, including Western Classical Tradition and an appreciation of music from a diverse range of cultures. We create a balance between written, analysis and practical work. Music technology is taught from Y7-Y11. The main music classroom has a rising stage and is permanently set up for band work. All practice rooms are set up for band work and include a range of well-used instruments.

Instruments/Singing

Our young people learn to sing from their very first lesson in Y7. This promotes well-being, self-confidence, teamwork, and a sense of belonging. A Y7 choir is quickly established, and our young people perform at our Y6 Open Evening. Each September, around 50% of the year group perform for potential parents and young people. We sing in a range of styles regularly throughout KS3. Our young people are encouraged to sing solos, in pairs, in groups and as a class, including adding harmonies and rap. All Y7 learn to play rhythms on percussion instruments, then we move onto the drum kit, keyboard, ukulele, and guitar. This culminates in our first band project at the end of Y7. In Y8, we use more technology and our young people gradually become more independent, choosing their preferred instruments. In Y9, we start with a band project, then move onto songwriting in bands. Some of our talented DJ students teach other Y9s how to DJ. Our very independent GCSE students generally focus on their main instrument and work well in bands.

Partnerships

We work closely with Derby & Derbyshire Music Partnership and Peak District Music Centre to provide further curricular and co-curricular opportunities for our young people. We relish opportunities to perform, and our music lead attends and part-hosts network meetings. This enables collaboration, sharing ideas and informs new initiatives in pedagogy. More recently, we have started collaborations with Sheffield University Music Department, Sheffield Music Hub, and have performed in joint concerts in with

Sheffield University students. Hope Valley College continues to be one of the lead Secondary Schools for Derbyshire.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Instrumental Tuition

Instrumental tuition is extremely popular and is offered to <u>all</u> our young people. We offer lessons in the following;

Guitar (all types), Ukulele

Additional GCSE support sessions are also arranged on an ad hoc basis.

We have a mix of music hub accredited and self-employed instrumental teachers. Many teachers work for Sheffield Music Hub, Derby & Derbyshire Music Partnership and/or Peak District Music Centre.

Currently, 130 young people access instrumental tuition (23% of school roll). 15% are PP and some have additional needs.

Instrumental Lessons are funded mainly by Parents/Carers; although students who are PP are funded by Hope Valley College. There is also a financial bursary provided by Derby & Derbyshire Music Partnership for families that meet the criteria.

All co-curricular clubs are free, except Big Band and Wind Band. We ask for a small voluntary contribution each term to make these financially viable. All clubs are open to all our young people.



How to Ensure Progress Outside of Lesson Time

To ensure progress and full inclusion, we:

- **loan** instruments, including keyboards and guitars, to GCSE students, where necessary.
- As music is so popular during breaks and lunchtime, a timetable is in place to cater for our young people. GCSE students can access music every lunchtime (Tues-Fri from 1pm).



- Derbyshire Music Hub offer City and County Wind Band and Orchestra. Their intermediate Derby Schools Orchestra and Choir. We promote these to our young people and some attend.
- Peak District Music Centre offer Beginner Wind Band, Strings, intermediate wind band, Peak District Wind band, Training, and Intermediate string orchestra.
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Part C: Musical Experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.
